A certain man of the house of Levi went and married a Levite woman. The woman conceived and bore a son; and when she saw how beautiful he was, she hid him for three months. When she could hide him no longer, she got a wicker basket for him and calked it with bitumen and pitch. She put the child into it and placed it among the reeds by the bank of the Nile. And his sister stationed herself at a distance, to learn what would befall him.

A daughter of Pharaoh came down to bathe in the Nile, while her maidens walked along the Nile. She spied the basket among the reeds and sent her slave girl to fetch it. When she opened it, she saw that it was a child, a boy crying. She took pity on it and said, "This must be a Hebrew child." Then his sister said to Pharaoh's daughter, "Shall I go and get you a Hebrew nurse to suckle the child for you?" And Pharaoh's daughter answered, "Yes." 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Philo, Joseph, Eusebius, Bible. Intro, creation, responsibility, evil.

Evil = Egyptian slavery. Cry out. God hears.

"One man stands against an empire" - Jesus image as opposed to Bible's treatment of Moses as ambassador - prophecy of deliverance by one man - proclaims his birth - claim Israel expects deliverer.

The decision to kill the new-born only after Moses' birth and because news of deliverer's birth has spread among Hebrew slaves - question: God or man?

Time frames Raamses I Seti.

Miriam and her mother bow heads in prayer - Pharoah's sister finds child herself - hides child from all but one woman - no explanation how she passes Moses off as her own. Her husband is dead. Child "answer to my prayers." He shall be Pharoah. She gives him the name Moses - as if Egyptian name drawn out of Nile - midrash Moses as returning conqueror - story of serpents, Khartoum. Mention of Moses as responsible for building store cities. He had been sent to destroy a city - explanation of Cushite wife. When Ethiopian queen gives him stone and praises its beauty.

Rivalry with brother over throne and nefertiti made up

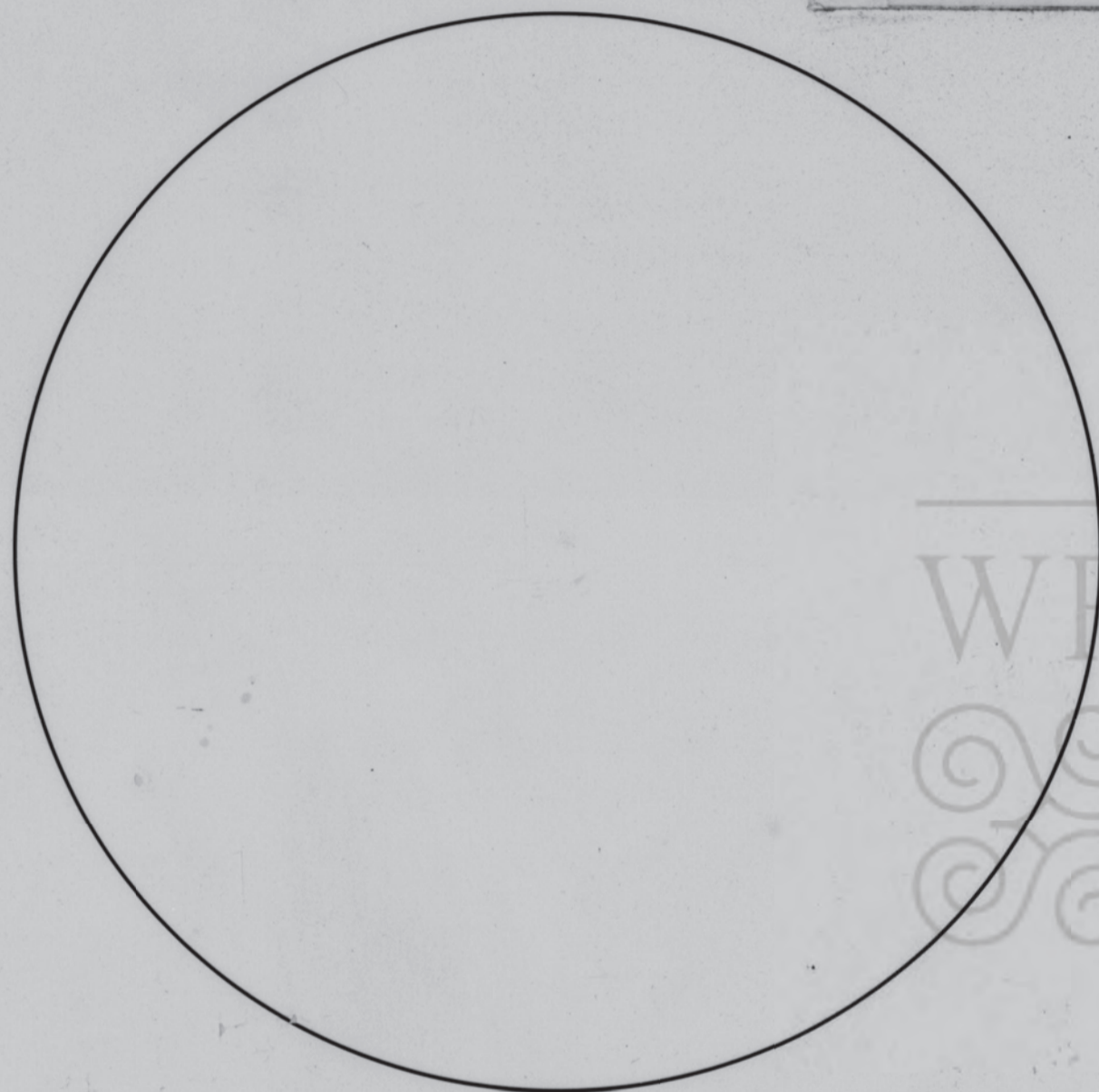
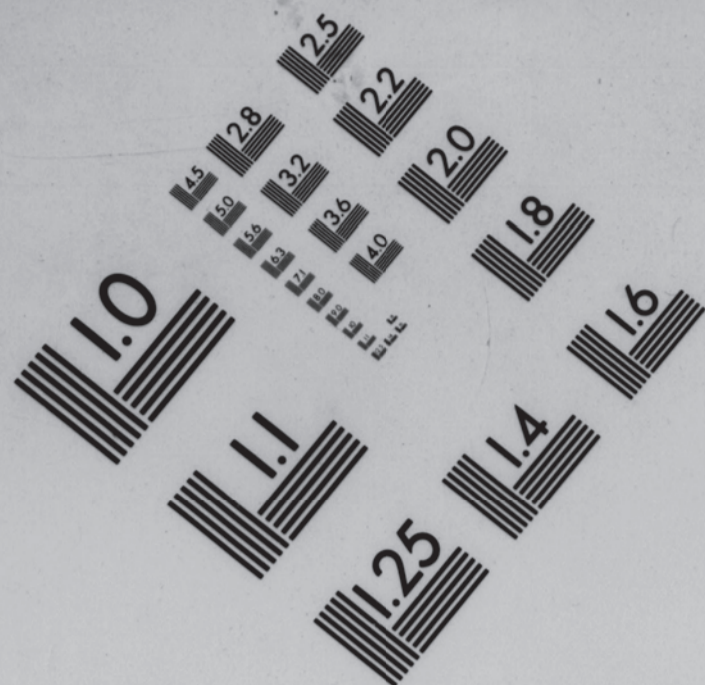
