NOTE TO USHERS: RE: CONSECRATION


1. DO NOT SEAT ANYONE IN 1ST ROW.
2. WHEN SERVICE REACHES PAGE 240 - 2 USHERS TAKE RIBBON OFF RESERVED SEATS - THEN PROCEED TO TWO DOORS.
3. CUE FOR OPENING DOORS: - PAGE 252 "WE WILL REJOICE AND BE GLAD IN IT"
4. RABBI SILVER COMES UP AND READS "BORUCH HABAH - BLESSED BE YOU WHO COME IN THE NAME OF THE LORD . . ." PERMIT CHILDREN TO ENTER AFTER RABBI SILVER SAYS "WE BLESS YOU OUT OF THE HOUSE OF THE LORD"
5. USHERS MEET GROUP AT TOP OF AISLE AND ESCORT THEM TO THE 3 SECTIONS RESERVED FOR THEM. THE TEACHERS WITH THE GROUP KNOW WHICH SECTION TO FILL.

A TIME OF BEGINNINGS — FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

My first open letter to you of this season is a good time to talk of one or two beginnings. This week we begin again our Sunday services. I am going to tell you something of what I found and saw during our stay in Israel. I am going to talk of my impressions of the people, of the politics and the problems of surviving in a tense and armed world.

On Wednesday, October 5th, we begin our Third Annual Bible Study Institute. It will be held on each of the Wednesday afternoons of October. This event which begins at one p.m. is sponsored by The Temple Women's Association. I try to give a slice of the Bible which will help everyone to read and understand and enjoy its chapters and teachings. We try to approach it in a way which will open to the reader the many levels of meaning within the text.

This year we will deal with the daily institutions of Bible life; the tribe, marriage and the family, government, and religion. Most Bible courses deal with separate books or great personalities and I thought it would be interesting to fill in the general background in which David and Isaiah lived. It is difficult to understand the ethic and teaching in Scripture unless you are aware of the times and the political and religious facts of Hebrew life. To expose these is our goal.

I know I will see each of you many times during the year, but I would like especially to see you at each of these firsts.

AND God spoke to Moses; saying: Set aside seven days for a time of
thanksgiving and rejoicing after the harvesting of the crops in the
field. Include everyone in the celebration -- family, friends and
strangers.

AND God commanded the children of Israel to build Sukkot, to remind
us of the small dwellings which protected our fathers from the desert
heat after they had left Egypt. Our Sukkot are built of palm branches
and are decorated on the inside with the fruits and vegetables of the
harvest.

WHAT meaning does this Bible teaching have for us today? What im-
portance is there in giving thanks for a bountiful harvest?

WHAT is harvest? In the traditional meaning, a harvest of good crops
feeds us and helps to keep us healthy and for this we are thankful. But
there are other harvests as well. Health itself is a harvest. There is
the harvest of love, the kind of love between parent and child, husband

and wife, that allows each to grow and realize his own worth; the kind of love that allows a true sharing of ideas, where parent and child alike truly listen to the ideas of the other, where parent and child alike understand and accept the other.

THERE is the harvest of knowledge and wisdom that we gain not only from school study but also from an awareness of the world around us.

THERE is the harvest of appreciation of the earth on which we live. We have come to the point in time where we must now stop littering and spoiling our environment so that future generations may also enjoy the beauty to which we have become accustomed and which we now stand in danger of destroying.

THERE is the harvest derived from giving to those less fortunate.

AS God instructed us, we remember today the times past, when men gave thanks to God at Sukkot for the good food they had grown on their farms. Today we thank God not only for the food on our tables but also for the love of parents and children, for our comfortable homes, for the satisfaction of doing our jobs well, and we ask for guidance so that we may strive harder for the enrichment and well-being of all mankind.

Lord of the Universe, Creator of all, we praise your greatness and goodness at the harvest festival of Sukkot. We know of Your presence in the beauty of the seasons when we eat the fruit of harvest.

SILENT PRAYER

Let this day inspire us to the true meaning of faith in God. Let us understand that when we are good and kind to others -- to our parents, our children, our teachers, our co-workers, our friends and those less fortunate -- we are in the very best way thanking God for His goodness to us. Sukkot is harvest time. When each of us lives in such a way as to bring happiness to all around us, this truly is the most beautiful harvest of all.

On this holiday of Sukkot, the Feast of Tabernacles, O God, we remember gratefully the loving care with which you watched over the Jews in ancient times as they wandered in the desert. You gave them Sukkot, booths, in which they could live. You supplied food when there was none in the desert. You guided them to follow your law.

WE PRAY to You on this sacred day with the joyous symbols of our feasts: the fruitful palm, the fragrant etrog, the thick-leaved myrtle, and the low-hanging willow. They remind us of the time when Moses first brought the children of Israel to the Promised Land, when Israel first became the homeland of the Jews in ancient days and first began to teach the world about the One God.

These symbols remind us of the unity of all Jews, of the common duties and tasks of a people consecrated, committed to God's law.

O Lord, give us the strength and courage to stand firm by You, to keep our faith in You, and to help bring justice to Jews the world over. Let us work today to win freedom for the Russian Jews to practice their Judaism in freedom and for the Israeli Jews to live in peace with their Arab neighbors.

Help us to remember the past history of our people and to dream the dreams of the future. May we never stop hoping and working for that spiritual harvest when all people accept the truth of God's law and stand united as one common brotherhood.
