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INTRODUCTION

Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver came to The Temple in August of 1917.

A young man, only two years past his ordination, he took over one of the leading congregations in America and has served it faithfully and led it courageously ever since.

Looking forward to his seventieth birthday, and mindful of forty-five years of consecrated ministry, the congregation was eager to dignify the occasion in a way which would express their abiding friendship and admiration. It was decided that the most appropriate tribute would be a publication of a Jubilee Volume which would set out Dr. Silver's own activities, list his writings, briefly indicate his concerns, and contain contributions by rabbis, scholars, and world leaders who have shared his interests and worked with him in common cause. It was felt Dr. Silver would appreciate this contribution to scholarship more than any personal token. It was known that many of his friends and fellow workers were eager to add their well wishes to those of the congregation. It was anticipated that the community at large would benefit by such a delineation of his life and accomplishments. The publication of such a work was undertaken and made possible through the generosity of many of his Temple friends and is intended as a statement of their respect.

We are grateful to Rabbi Daniel Jeremy Silver, who undertook the many-sided responsibilities of editing this volume, and to Drs. Solomon B. Freehof, Emanuel Neumann, and Solomon Zeitlin, who, in addition to Rabbi Daniel Silver, lent their advice as a Board of Editors. As is usual in the case of such a Festschrift, no attempt was made to circumscribe the subject matter of the individual contributors. Their essays represent their expression of personal and scholarly homage. However, it will be noted that by and large the articles center on Dr. Silver's primary areas of concern: Judaism and Jewish survival, the Bible and rabbinic scholarship, the common weal and mankind's betterment.

What needs to be added is only a word of loving respect on behalf of those whom Dr. Silver has helped to educate in their faith, consecrate in their marriage, find rootage in their community, support in their grief, and establish in their civic undertakings by the quality and example of his person and by the challenge and force of his intellect and his preaching.

in defending their localities against attack. A number of documents in the volume seem to indicate that the bearing of arms, defense, and even attacks by Jews, do not seem to have been exceptions. At certain times Jews were obliged to furnish armed guards (nos. 64, 118, 676, 992, 993) or were dealing in arms (no. 765).

Finally, a complaint brought by a noble before a court is reprinted (no. 8 of 1455) stating that 83 armed Jews had fallen upon his estate, taken away fruit, beaten up his people, etc. Even though this complaint may have been a frameup, the fact that it was brought before a court may indicate that armed Jews and attack by armed Jews were plausible at that time. In other words, that possession (and use) of arms by Jews may not have been rare. At any rate, these and some other documents in the volume could at least raise the question of how wide a gap lay between laws and regulations concerning Jews and actual practice. How far does Jewish historiography, which concentrates, for the most part, on description and analysis of the multitude of anti-Jewish laws and orders, deviate from a valid depiction of the reality of Jewish life?

SILVER, DANIEL JEREMY, Ed. In Time of Harvest: Essays in Honor of Abba Hillel Silver on the Occasion of His 70th Birthday. New York. Macmillan Co. 1963. Pp. viii, 459.

First, a prescript ad personam. The name of Abba Hillel Silver, I fear, is in danger of being short-changed by Jewish history; that is, if we understand "history" as the recording of events by humans. Without quibbling as to whether events are hero-created or hero-creating, in this instance history should categorically affirm the herculean role which Abba Hillel Silver played in the epochal political campaign to achieve Jewish statehood. Again and again must it be reemphasized: the story of American Zionism's contributions to this historic victory has not been adequately chronicled. On the contrary, we have had a tawdry spate of personal memorabilia from relatively puny bystanders, mostly from abroad, arrogating to themselves major credit for these accomplishments, while dismissing the achievements and impact of Silver and his colleagues with cavalier and studied indifference. This reviewer, as Assistant to the Director of the American Zionist Emergency Council (considered by many to have been the most efficient apparatus ever created in modern Zionism) during the period of Dr. Silver's leadership, was witness to event after event when, literally, a "hero" made history. Hesitancy he transformed into decisiveness, confusion he displaced with clarity, the supine he straightened, the cowardly he made redoubtable. For example, the story of May, 1948, when only Ben-Gurion and he dammed the enervating waves lapping at Jewish resistance, is but the climactic event which still awaits telling.

Hence, it was with gratification that one greeted the appearance of this volume. The gratification was enhanced by the competent editorship of his son, who succeeded an eminent father in a distinguished pulpit. This was a righteous reward. Alas, the honoree of this respectable Festschrift died too soon after the celebration of his birthday. Ironically and tragically, his death came almost commemoratively on the eve of the anniversary of his greatest achievement, the historic vote at the United Nations proclaiming the creation of a Jewish State.

For convenience I have classified these essays under locse categories. Under the general rubrie of "Zionism and Jewish Survival" are included "The Ingathering of the Exiles and an Exemplary Nation" by David Ben-Gurion, "Israel in the World of Iceas" by Abba Eban, "Israel—A Pilot Project for Total Development of Water Resources" by Walter Clay Lowdermilk, "Israel and the Diaspora" by Emanuel Neumann, "American Cultural Influence on Israel" by Raphael Patai and "The Future of the Zionist Movement" by Moshe Sharett, Lowdermilk's is a rather brief and unambitious survey of the water problem in Israel, and Patai's sociological treatment of intercultural influence is disappointingly journalistic and inadequate. Neither is successful in lifting this group of essays from the level of the banal and pedestrian. Are we to extrapolate from these nonexceptionable discussions a dismaying prognosis of Zionism's future? (Incidentally, we miss, in this volume, even a glancing reference to the inner state of affairs of the American Jewish community.) The situation of the Zionist movement is grave. None of these contributions point to the way out of the morass.

More interesting are the contributions which I would collate under the heading of post-biblical history and ideas. Unique and significant are the essays by the late and revered President of Israel, Itzhak Ben-Zvi, "The Levites among Arabian Tribes" and by his illustrious and more emotionally incandescent successor, Zalman Shazar, "The Idea of Redemption in Hassidic Thought." "Torah u-gedulah be-maqom ehad" can be truly applied to the chiefs of state elected in Israel. May this tradition continue. Ben-Zvi, adding to his important contributions to Jewish ethnography and historical concern for Oriental Jewry, writes about the linguistic interaction of early Arabs and Israelites. Although brief, it is a solid excursus. Shazar, the "farbrenter hosid," ignites his thesis—the cooling of the early ardor for personal hasidic aliyah was attributable to a deliberately motivated disenchantment emerging from the bitter debacle of Shabbetai Zeviwith a perfervid paean of lyrical prose which is inspiring. The subject of these rabbinic and hasidic pilgrimages to Palestine in the 17th and 18th centuries invite depth-exploration as to whether they constitute nascent Zionism or residual messianism, viewed as they should be in the context of the social-economicpolitical ripples they caused in European Jewry.

Essays by Moshe Davis, "'A Highway of Nations': A Chapter in the Nine-teenth-century America-Eretz Yisrael Activities"; Walter J. Fischel, "A Hitherto Unknown Jewish Traveler to India"; Jacob R. Marcus, "The Oldest Known Synagogue Record Book of Continental North America 1720-1721"; Oscar K. Rabinowicz, "A Jewish State in Midian"; Gershom Scholem, "The Sprouting of the Horn of the Son of David"; Solomon Zeitlin, "The Origin of the Idea of the Messiah" and Ellis Rivkin, "Ben Sira and the Nonexistence of the Synagogue"—all are interesting contributions in the field of post-biblical history. In Davis' survey one can note several striking parallels to contemporary affairs as they affect America-Israel activities and relations. As with many of Prof. Zeitlin's writings, whether one holds with them or not, this one merely tickles the palate and only serves to whet the appetite for a longer treatment of the subject.

Merely for purposes of classification, I have included Rivkin's audacious and intriguing analysis in this category. This is a challenging and equanimity-shattering study and ranks, in my opinion, as the best contribution to this Festschrift. Flying in the face of scholarly consensus, he tests and rejects the following theses expounded by several historians: "Institutions such as the synagogue, which were unknown to Ben Sira, are described as flourishing the institution which was flourishing, the Temple, is described as losing its hold on the people. The class of soferim which had no authority is pictured as molding and protecting the law, while the priestly class who wielded absolute authority are represented as sharing it with the scribal class. The as yet nonexistent exegetical or midrashic mode is taken for granted; the existing unchallenged supremacy of the literal Pentateuch is denied" (p. 321). This is the historical bomb which he tosses

Does he detonate the scholarly world to its foundations or is it a dud? Prof. Rivkin articulates several rigid methodological formulae, based primarily upon the exclusive utilization of Ben Sira as the only authentic source for the period. Two questions immediately obtrude: First, are sources external to Ben Sira of no, or inconsequential, weight? Second, while it may be true that the synagogue as an institution did not as yet compete with the Temple and did not play a fully-panoplied role of ritual importance, was it not already growing and developing in this period? Rivkin's characterization of Ben Sira as a "lone keeper" and as a "sentinel source, standing guard over the structural realities of an epoch" are romantically attractive, yet one feels somewhat uneasy about entrusting exclusive dominion to but one "sentinel."

Nelson Glucck's short and rather perfunctory piece on "Biblical Archaeology and Reform Judaism," Benjamin Mazar on "David's Reign in Hebron and the Conquest of Jerusalem," Daniel J. Silver on "Monarchy" and Naphtali H. Tur-Sinai's discussion "On Some Obscure Passages in the Book of Psalms I-XXXV" comprise the section of Bible and biblical history.

Two articles on intertestamentary studies—Morton S. Enslin's "Paul—What Manner of Jew?" and Samuel Sandmel's "Son of Man'"—provide a backdrop to current interest in interfaith relationships. Prof. Enslin's thesis is that Paul's conversion was only secondarily due to a "dissatisfaction with the Law." Rather was it primarily built upon a growing conviction that the divine blessing was accorded to Jesus principally because of the crucifixion, instead of the contemporary Jewish feeling that his execution was indicative of his impotence. Sandmel interprets the oft-recurring phrase "Son of Man" in the N.T. as a literary device utilized by the authors of the Gospels in an "off-stage aside," as it were, to point up Jesus' relationship to cosmic history.

The three remaining essays are "The Chuppah" by Solomon Freehof, a legal-social study of the history of this custom, "Religion and the Free Society" by Robert Gordis, pointing to some current perplexities in modern society vis-àvis religion, and "On Toynbee's Use of the Term Syriac for One of His Societies" by Harry M. Orlinsky, a short but devastating cannonade against one of Toynbee's typically inaccurate usages.

The volume, attractively and impressively manufactured, is prefaced by a useful apparatus, including an appreciation by one of Silver's close assistants, Harold P. Manson, as well as a bibliography and selections from his writings. An enduring tribute to a great man.

GRAYZEL, SOLOMON. A History of the Contemporary Jews from 1900 to the Present. New York and Philadelphia. Meridian Books, Inc. and The Jewish Publication Society of America. 1960. Pp. 192.

This review of Jewish history during the six decades of the present century speaks more in terms of causes, pressures, trends and circumstances than in terms of events and chronology. It opens with a discussion of the socio-economic, political and religio-cultural conditions under which eastern European Jews lived at the end of the 19th and the beginning of the 20th century, and which cumulatively made for their exodus from the lands of their birth and the creation of a new diaspora.

The author records the reactions of the immigrants from politically absolutist, religiously monolithic and economically backward countries, to American democratic, religiously permissive, economically dynamic and socially fluid American

Memorial Volume in Honor of Rabbi Henry Cohen of Galveston


Henry Cohen: Messenger of the Lord is the title of a Memorial Volume in commemoration of the 100th anniversary of the birth of the sainted preacher, writer and civic leader, Rabbi Henry Cohen, the late spiritual leader of Congregation B'nai Israel in Galveston, Texas. He served as Rabbi and Rabbi Emeritus for sixty-four years.

Rabbi A. Stanley Dreyfus, the present spiritual leader of the Congregation, who compiled this volume, writes in his Foreword:

"He (Rabbi Cohen) was a man, intensely human, with his share of frailties. That which set him apart from the generality of men, which constituted his peculiar greatness, was a mind richly informed by Jewish idealism, a heart responsive to the universalism of Israel's prophets, a spirit unusually sensitive to the pain and suffering of other people, and a passion to relieve distress wherever he found it.

"Unfortunately, Henry Cohen's own writings, as well as the biography prepared by his son and daughter-in-law and the many character sketches done of him are all out of print. Nor can a definitive account of his life be compiled before 1977, when his personal papers in the archives of the University of Texas will become available. At his request these documents are restricted for twenty-five years following his death. The titles of the 278 folders suggest that this extensive collection of correspondence, articles, sermons, and historical studies will attract the attention of students in many different fields."

The more than thirty articles, including those by the contributors, are classified under the following four chapter headings: Portrait of a Rabbi; Man of God, Lover of Man; Along Life's Pathway; From Henry Cohen's Writings. Profiles of Israeli Women

A kibbutznik, Miriam Baratz arrived from Russia fifty years ago, helped found the first kibbutz, Degania, and has been milking cows on the Jordan ever since. A heroine of the French Resistance, Anne Marie Lambert (her husband was shot by the Gestapo) took her baby on the first ship to Palescine after the war, became a shepherdess and later a member of Israel's diplomatic corps. And from England came a doctor, Fearl Ketcher, whose patients are Yemenite babies in the hills of Jerusalem.

Daughters from Afar was acclaimed by noted book reviewers in The New York Times, The London Times Literary Supplement, The Jerusalem Post, to mention a few.

The stories of these women, and of those who came from points as different in geography and background as Bagdad and Brooklyn, compose a vibrant and personal picture of Israel in Daughters from Afar. (Bloch, \$3.95; announcement on page 27).

The Redeemed Children

This is the title of a moving, absorbing and informative book by Professor Ben Lappin of the University of Toronto. It deals with the heroic rescue work performed by Canadian Jewry during the years 1947-1952, when 1,116 Jewish war or hans whose families had been exterminated by the Nazis arrived in Canada to begin new lives. The Canadian Jewish Congress sponsored this great project of relief and rehabilitation, and Professor Lappin here recounts the details, using documents and case-histories.



Another volume presents the history of the Jews of Milwaukee. This book was prepared under the auspices of the American Jewis's History Center by Rabbi Lauis J. Swichkow and Dr. Lloyd Girtner.

The author of Messiah's Chains is a noted Yiddish novelist, playwright and printer. He was born in Russia in 1894, where he received his early rabbinic training. At the age of fifteen he became a student of the Mohilev Technical School of the Jewish Colonization Association. He continued his studies in Russian schools until 1914, when he went to London where he studied at St. James College. In London, Mr. Posy started his literary activities and wrote his first Yiddish book, "The World and the Jews." In 1916 he became co-editor of the London daily, "Yiddisher Express," and correspondent for various periodicals in Europe and America.

In 1920 he arrived in the United States, where he traveled for several years until he settled in Chicago in 1926 as a teacher in the Sholem Aleichem Schools and resumed his literary work, writing mostly plays for children. Mr. Posy was very prolific as a Yiddish playwright both for the schools and the legitimate Yiddish stage. Many of them were published here and abroad.

His juvenile books include "Israeli Tales and Legerds," "Holiday Night Dreams," and others.

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
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Notes on Current English Judaica

As will be noted from the many titles in this issue under "Recent Publications," this year's winterspring list shows an unusual output of English Judaica in America and England. The brief descriptions which fellow do not cover books featured on other pages by our advertisers and those published or controlled by Bloch.

Religious disputation between Iew and Christian has at all times centered upon the crucial themes which divide the New Testament from the Old. In this volume the distinguished scholar sets forth the most significant expressions of religious polemic and disputation from its beginnings to the present. Sharp, uncompromising, occasionally contentious and argumentative, this book is an important contribution to the renewed dialogue taking place in our time between Church and Synagogue, (\$4,50).

Jews, God and History, by Max I. Dimont, is a recent, impressive work giving a modern interpretation of Jewish history. The book is not only lively by its spirited prose, but unique by the author's point of view. He claims to see the history of the Jews always in relationship to the destiny of the people among whom they have lived, and frequently makes telling analogies with American history and contemporary events. The author's principal theme is-"that the Jews have as a civilization survived four thousand years through the basic strength of the ideas of Judaism, through adaptability and intelligence, and through sheer physical and moral courage." (\$7.50).

The Other Society, by H. Darin-Drapkin, is an absorbing and informative book giving a comprehensive account of the Israeli Kibbutzim, one of the pioneering social experiments of this century. Though written by a distinguished Israeli committed to the kibbutz community idea, its tone is never heless objective and dispassionate: Darin-Drabkin reports on the history of the communal groups from their beginnings in 1908, their rapid growth with the influx of European refugees after 1936, their present status and stability, (\$5.95).

The Judean Scrolls and Karaism, by Naphtali Wieder. In this scholarly work, the author aims to give the interpretation of Qumranism in the light of Karaism.

The main body of this book is thus devoted to a detailed critical examination of the surviving texts bearing on the views of the one hand and of the Qumran—Damascus sect on the other. The book ends with a chapter in which the author sets out his results concerning the relation between the two sectarian communities. (\$6.75).

Halacha Pesuka

This is the general title of a monumental halachic compilation on the Code of Jewish Jurisprudence—Shukhan Aruch.

The first volume (563 pages) of this rabbinic work from Jerusalem is devoted to the Choshen Hamishpat (I-VIII Laws of Judges). The compilation presents a comprehensive restatement of Jewish civil law based upon decisions of the Rabbis in the Talmud, Poskim and Responsa.

The Halacha Pesuka is followed by a major section called Berur Halacha, a compilation of the vast systems and decisions of rabbinic legislation expounded in the Talmud and its commentaries, as well as in responsa, with explanatory notes by Rabbi Yaakov Meshulam Ginsburg, together with an editorial board of other distinguished scholars consisting of Rabbis Eliyahu Yitzchak Prisman, Dov Meir Krausar and Shear-Yashuv Collen.

This remarkable rabbinic work was prepared and published by The Harry Fischel Institute for Research in Jewish Law, affiliated with Emet World Academy in Jerusalem, and made possible by The Harry and Jane Fischel Foundation, New York, headed by its President, Rabbi Herbert

S. Goldstein, and its Board of Directors.

Rabbi Shear - Yashuv Cohen, Director of the Institute, defines the purpose of the Halacha Pesuka project, as follows:

"... The Department for Rabbinical Legislation is now engaged in a new huge enterprise the compilation of a 'Halacha Pesuka on the Shukhan Aruch-Choshen Mishpat' on the lines of the 'Mishna Berura' on the Shulchan Aruch-Orach Chaim.

"It has as its aim to serve as a practical basis for the creation of a legal system for the State of Israel in accord with Torah true Jewish tradition, while at the same time it will be accepted by all Rabbinical circles as a basic work for the study of the Choshen Mishpat."

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

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Jewish Music Festival Celebrations From Purim to Passover

American Jewish and Israeli music will be featured in concerts and recitals by more than 2,000 educational, cultural, religious, fraternal, women's and recreational organizations in hundreds of cities between Purim and Passover (5723) during the 19th annual nationwide observance of Jewish Music Festival, March 10 to April 16, sponsored by the National Jewish Welfare Board's Jewish Music Council.

This major Jewish cultural event has for its theme this year "Bridging the Continents Through Israeli and American Jewish Music," and "Honoring Four American Jewish Composers." The four composers are Gershon Ephros, Heinrich Schalit, Solomon Rosowsky and Jacob Weinberg.

Rabbi Ario S. Hyams, chairman of the Jewish Music Council, announced that as one of the new program resources for Jewish Music Festival the JWB-sponsored Council has published Music in Israel Today. This 140-page annotated list of music about the land and people of Israel (vocal, choral, instrumental and orchestral) written by composers in the United States and Israel is the first volume of its kind.

Containing material for all performing media, music for various instruments and songs and prayers for solo singing and for choral groups, it was prepared in cooperation with the Music Alliance of the America-Israeli Cultural Foundation.

It is compiled by Leah M. Jaffa, JWB's consultant on the arts and executive secretary of the Jewish Music Council, and Issacher Miron (\$3.00).

A second new program resource issued by the Jewish Music Council for this year's Jewish Music Festival is a 35-page brochure entitled Music of Gershon Ephros, Solomon Rosowsky, Heinrich Schalit and Jacob Weinberg. It is devoted to the life and work of each of these composers of Jewish music. It was edited by Lewis Appleton. (\$1.00).

Cantatas, Etc.

In Freedom's Light. A Cantata for Unison Chorus and Piano, by Rabbi Jacob E. Segal of Detroit. A reissue of this popular cantata, highly effective for both confirmation services and adult programs, suitable for presentation by groups ranging in number from 12 to 49 performers. The music is arranged and composed by Zinovi Bistritzky (Bloch, \$2.00; announcement on page 77).

Aneinu, by Cantor Max Kotlowitz of Baltimore. Selected from the Selichot Service. Arranged for cantor and piano. Revised piano setting by Samuel Eugatch. (Bloch, \$1.50; announcement on page 78).

Yehi Or (Let There Be Light) is a new cantata by Baruch J. Cohon. It is arranged for baritone solo, mixed chorus and piano ac-

companiment.

The book is ready in time for Jewish Music Month. This cantata is also appropriate for Shavuot. Baruch J. Cohon, noted for his many other compositions, conveys in his works the rich idiom of our music tradition in the fervent, as well as melodious appeal of his convictions.

Yehi Or is divided into three parts: 1) Physical Light, 2) Spiritual Light, 3) Social Light. (Bloch, \$1.50).

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Bible Songs and Stories. Sixteen songs from Bible with Soloists, choir, and orchestra. Directed by Mitch Miller. With illustrated stories and text. 12" L.P. (4.98).

The New Modzitzer Melave Malke. Ben Zion Shenker, Chorus and Orchestra. Contains 11 numbers, including Hamavdil and Al Tiro. 12" L.P. (4.98). Shirei Shabbat Kodesh, by the noted composer and musicologist, Samuel Bugatch, is a complete Sabbath Service for the Synagogue.

It contains fifteen compositions, arranged for cantor (tenor or baritone), chorus and mixed voices (S.A.T.B.) and organ.

Mr. Bugatch, for the last seventeen years music director and choir master of Temple Adath Israel in the Bronx, presented this Service for the first time at the Temple with Mario Botoshansky as cantor soloist, Ludwig Greenbaum, organist, and augmented choir conducted by the composer. It was also presented at Temple B'nai Abraham, Newark, New Jersey, with Cantor Nathaniel Sprinzen as cantor soloist. Excerpts from this Service were also sung at the Jewish Music Forum, Jewish Museum, New York, with Cantor Boto-shansky and Ludwig Greenbaum at the piano. It created a very favorable impression at all of these functions.

In this Service, the composer kept himself strictly in the traditional musical synagogue chant. The many contrapuntal passages and the unique harmonic structures, plus the melodious singable solo passages of the cantor and the masterly treatment of the choral part, should make this service a worthwhile addition in the repertoire of any synagogue.

Samuel Bugatch, prominent composer-conductor, is one of America's important contributors to Jewish music. His more than forty published compositions and his great number of unpublished works include all musical forms, secular as well as liturgical.

Mr. Bugatch was born in Russia and while only a boy of eleven, he was composing music sung by the local cantorate. At the age of thirteen he came to Baltimore, Maryland, where he sang in various synagogue choirs and conducted various choruses. He received his formal musical education at the well known Peabody Conservatory of Music, where he received the much coveted Certificate of Teacher of Harmony and Composition. His compositions are used extensively in this country and Canada.

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A Superlative (and Readable!) Tribute

IN THE TIME OF HARVEST. Sciomon B. Freehof, Emanuel Neumann, Daniel Jeremy Silver, Solomon Zeithin. The Macmilian Co., New York, 459 p.p.

The eminence and authority of Ita 27 contributors guaranteed the importance-but not the surprising readability-of this book. For literary productions prepared for special occasions are often like testimonial dinners: impressive but indigestible. That this book is both excellent and interesting, shatters a time-honored tradition, for which the authors and editors must be held accountable.

This is certainly to the good. For Abba Hillel Silver is a commanding figure, but he is not, thank goodness, a national shrine -and it is pleasant to predict that this tribute to him will probably be enjoyed, rather than merely admired.

Although none of Dr. Silver's own scholarly output is included (which I regret), there are generous samplings from his sermons, drawn from stenographic texts. They capture his eloquence and his prophetic temper-especially his concern for the poor and persecuted of every race and creed. This is the Judaic "social gospel" in the great traditiona demonstration of fearless conviction, in comparison with which the mild, temporizing tone of mary modern sermons sounds like Bing Crosby.

The only other piece that deals directly with Dr. Silver's life and work is Harold P. Manson's keynote "appreciation." The author, who was closely associated with the great rabbl during Dr. Silver's crucial leadership of American Zionism, oners a warm and lucid appraisal of his intellectual and political stature as well as his deep humanity-in the context of modern history. It is a valuable contribution to our understanding of a period-well within our own time-which somehow seems more obscure to most of as than are the annals of ancient Palestine.

We are reminded of Dr. Silver's

dramatic role in rallying popular-Essays in honor of Abba Hillel and political support for militant Silver on the occasion of his policies, against heartbreaking 70th birthday. Daniel Jeremy opposition, sometimes from within Bitver, editor. Board of editors: the Zionist movement itself, as well as from the State Departmert. Even if one rejects the "great man" theory of historical causality (as does this reviewer). it is difficult to deny that the Jowish State might not have come into being within our generation had it not been for the energy, diplomatic skill, and uncompromising integrity of Dr.

> The essays in this large and beautifully-produced volume so encompass Judalsm's infinite range and variety, that I can permit myself only brief mentior, of some of them. There is, for instance, Abba Eban's "Israel and the World of Ideas," which proposes that the Jewish State, of all the world's nations, is uniquely qualified to heal the dangerous and tragte schism between the "two cultures" science and the amushittes.

I mest add that one could have to be dear and blind to resist the beauty, rhythm and resonance of Mr. Eban's literary style-which should be enshrined in English textbooks rather than the srivel that now reposes in most of them.

David Ben-Gurion's "The Ingathering of the Exites and an Exemplary Nation," presents the scholarly scaffolding for his wellknown point-of-view regarding the preeminence of aliyah in the outlook for Jewish survival.

There is a fascinating chapter on the early "messengers" in America for Palestire settlement projects ("A Highway of Nations" by Moshe Davis) and an informative investigation of the meaning of biblical archeology by Nelson

There are studies of ancient history and anthropology by Ishak Ben-Zvi, Merston S. Englin and Benjamin Mazar: and on the problems of Zionism by Emanuel Neumann, Moshe Sharelt and others.

There are excellent articles, by Jacob R. Marcus, Walter J. Pischel, Robert Gordis (whose solid study of the American church-state issue is the best I have ever read); Walter Clay Lowdermilk, Harry M. Orlinsky. Oskar K. Rabinowicz, Ellis Rivkin, Zalman Shazar, Daniel Jeremy Silver, Napththall H. Tur-Sinal and Solomon Zeitlim-and there is a bibliography of Dr. Bilver's writings by Miriam Liekind.

In short, this is practically a small library of Jewish thought. religion, history and rital current problems.


